"No Place like Home"



What is "No Place Like Home"?

The St Helier and Surrey Kidney Patients Association is launching an appeal to raise money to help dialysis patients perform their treatment in the comfort of their own home rather than travel to St Helier or one of the Satellites.

As a dialysis patient under St Helier's care you already have choice. You have the main unit, seven Satellites (Epsom will make it eight) and also peritoneal dialysis (PD). St Helier has an established PD therapy option and these patients realise the benefit of fitting their treatment around their life without the need to travel to a dialysis unit three times a week. This appeal will hopefully give that choice to haemodialysis patients.

The idea for this appeal came from a generous donation from the "Sussex for Sussex" Freemasons of £10,000. This donation was used to allow a Horsham based patient to start home dialysis and gave the KPA the idea of helping others to "find their way home" rather like Dorothy in the Wizard of Oz, hence our appeal logo. We've even got our own Dorothy in our Home Dialysis Sister, Debbie Noble.

Freedom comes at a cost and in the current economic climate with planned NHS budget cuts of £20 billion by 2014 the KPA want to help the Renal Unit with the set up costs of home based HD patients. These costs are approximately £6,000 - £7,000 per patient.

Can I ask you all to consider helping our appeal by either personal donation or by organising fundraising events?

We have already decided to use World Kidney Day (10th March 2011) as a fundraiser and will be collecting in Horsham Town Centre. We've been granted a Street Collection Permit by Horsham District Council so a big thanks to HDC. We are looking for volunteers to help collect on the day and if you can help please contact either Jim Rae or Myself.

Thank you in anticipation of your help with our appeal.

St Helier & Surrey KPA Grand Draw

Under the rules of the London Borough of Sutton Small Lottery Licence, we are only permitted to print tickets to a maximum value of £20,000 for any one single draw. I became the KPA's Treasurer in November 2006 and at that time we had about 4,800 patients who received Renality and therefore were mailed a book of tickets. By November 2010 the number of patients to whom we needed to mail Renality and tickets had increased to around 5,700 and one can assume that by November 2011 we will be looking at a number closer to 5,900.

Of course this has meant that we have had to make that £20,000 stretch further and further each year, hence each year each book contains fewer and fewer tickets – I hope this answers the questions I know people have raised about the declining number of tickets in each book.

For many years the Xmas Draw Prizes were supported by a generous donation from the Peacock Trust (2010 =

£1,500), alas the Peacock Trust have informed us that we no longer fit within the scope of charities that they wish to support; so in 2011 fundraising will effectively start off £1,500 down – and this in the year where the KPA launches the “No Place Like Home” (NPLH) Appeal.

The KPA Committee have decided in 2011 to run two Prize Draws, one in the summer (the proceeds of which will go to the NPLH Appeal) and the usual one at Xmas (General Funds of the KPA). With the Summer Draw we shall be trying an experiment; I will try here not to bore you too much. We will print 20,000 £1 tickets, in each Renality we shall put 3 tickets; we then anticipate that we will have around 2,500 tickets in a reserve for those of you who wish additional tickets. The prizes of which there will be 5 (£500, £200, £100 and 2 x £50) will total £900.

My mother, Ruth Dechant passed away suddenly in September 2009 – a year on from her passing, I and my wife, Justine, ran the Windsor Half Marathon to raise money for the Kidney Patients Association in her memory.

The training had been tough at times, but worthwhile as neither of us had attempted anything like this before. The amount of people who kept telling us that the Windsor course was particularly tough and hilly made the prospect daunting, but also helped to raise those levels of determination. There were times when it seemed like too much, but the generous amount of sponsorship that was coming in was all the inspiration we needed to carry on. The day of the race was disappointingly cloudy, with a cool wind and the threat of rain, but it didn't dampen our spirits as the 6,000 competitors started to gather at the start.

We wanted to run as much of it as possible together, aiming to finish in under two and a half hours. Soon after the eight mile mark, it was clear that Justine's legs were stronger and she powered away, completing the in course in a fine time of 2hours, 18 minutes and 51 seconds. I, meanwhile, struggled on, but was delighted to make it down the Long Walk to complete in 2 Hours 26 Minutes 11 seconds, still under my target time.

We are both proud of our achievement, but are equally proud to have raised a total of £1,461.30 for the Association. We have been touched by people's generosity, and I know that mum would have appreciated everything everyone did to support us.


Although she has thanked everyone, I would like to thank the Renal Unit and friends and KPA for making it such a special day.

Surrey Renal Unit - update

I hope that you all had a relaxing and enjoyable break over the Christmas and New Year period. I would like to start by thanking everyone in the Renal Unit for the hard work and excellent care that has been given through 2010. I appreciate that these are challenging times. However, I am constantly reminded how lucky I am to work in the Renal Unit, and be surrounded by such a dedicated team.

As you know, in April 2009 NHS Surrey issued a tender for the provision of Renal Services across the county. The Renal Unit at St Helier is the current provider of approximately 90% of this work, and is committed to developing the shape of renal care in Surrey with an enhanced local service.

We were actively bidding for the service, and the tender had reached the point where two bidders were left in competition. Our bid entailed providing in-patient care at St Peter's Hospital, Chertsey, utilising the expertise of our current staff at St Helier with a gradual transition to more independence of the new service over a number of years.

Over the Christmas period, we heard that NHS Surrey have withdrawn the tender so the service will remain unchanged. I understand that NHS Surrey have to balance so many priorities with the changing role of the PCTs, and the need to manage increased productivity on a reducing budget. At the time of writing, NHS Surrey have not had their board meeting to explain their decision.

I have mixed feelings about this. On a positive level, this gives us certainty that our service will continue, and we can continue to focus on delivering renal care with the knowledge that there is no threat of another renal unit taking away our work.

However, many of us (including patients) have felt that we could offer a great service within the county of Surrey, and that there was opportunity to deliver better local care. Sadly, this vision is not going to materialise in the near future, but it should not stop us considering how we can develop and improve what we already do.

I know that many of you have been actively involved in the bidding process: - collecting information, developing models of care, attending numerous meetings, talking to other patients and staff, and considering your own future. I would like to thank those of you that have had direct input into this project, and I recognise the stress that the uncertainty may have caused. Special thanks must go to Paul Connolly and Dave Spensley who have both worked tirelessly on your behalf behind the scenes.

We can now concentrate on what we do best - delivering renal care to the population of south west London and Surrey. All of us within the department play a key role in making the Renal Unit a special place to be, with patient care at the centre of all that we do.

On behalf of the Renal Management Team, I am pleased that we have certainty for our immediate future, and that we have the opportunity to make 2011 a positive year for the Renal Unit. Please remember, this is your renal unit and staff and the kidney patients association need to hear your voice so that we can work together for better care.

Surrey In Patient Centre



Over the past year I have been reporting on this project and in my last message I said that a decision would hopefully be made in the first quarter of 2011.

St Helier has recently been told by NHS Surrey that their tender is being withdrawn and the centre therefore will not happen.

I am amazed at NHS Surrey's action and cannot understand their reasoning.

I have been involved with this project for nearly 2 years, originally as a patient representative for NHS Surrey to put the tender model together and then on the various workstreams for the St Helier & St Georges bid to host the service at St Peters Hospital.

We have had numerous meetings with NHS Surrey over the 18 months since the tender was first issued and have amended our model several

times to accommodate their revisions. We believed we had an extremely strong clinical and financial bid that would meet the needs of both NHS Surrey and, more importantly, the renal community of Surrey.

I have no idea why the tender has been withdrawn and intend to write to the Chief Executive of NHS Surrey to ask for an explanation.

Two years ago NHS Surrey held road shows on this project which were attended by numerous patients, carers, family member of renal patients and medical staff where we were promised a “state of the art in-patient centre” without the need to travel to St Helier or St Georges and I personally would like to know why they have reneged on their promise to provide this much needed facility.

St Helier has developed a really good working relationship with St Georges and St Peters as a result of this tender process which can only be good for the future but I cannot help but think that NHS Surrey have caused us all to waste a great deal of effort, time and money.

Renal Unit News:

A profile of the Acting Clinical Director:

As many of you know, James Marsh has taken a six month sabbatical to focus on delivering the best possible bid for long term Renal Services in Surrey. I have therefore stepped up as the Clinical Director of the Renal Unit while James has a period of 'paternity leave'.

I was born and bred in Cambridge, where my family still live. I had a very happy school career, ruined only by a badly broken wrist sustained when playing rugby in the sixth form. After two operations and three months in plaster, I realised that I quite liked hanging around hospitals. At the last minute, I changed my university course from engineering to medicine and the rest, as they say, is history!

I studied pre-clinical medicine at Balliol College, Oxford. Bored of Oxbridge life, I moved to the East End of London and performed my clinical studies at the Royal London Hospital. That was a culture shock, to say the least! I subsequently rotated around the major London Hospitals before moving to the Renal Registrar rotation at the Hammersmith Hospital. From there I moved to a Clinical Lectureship at Guy's Hospital, which was a 50:50 mix of clinical medicine and research. Whilst at The Hammersmith Hospital and Guy's, I worked with many of the leading members of the nephrology, and it is still a matter of amazement and pride when strangers come up to me in a foreign land and say 'so you actually knew...'. On a more prosaic note, I also helped train Drs Marsh and Quan, who have moved on to more local fame!

After my MD and ten years of commuting across London, I was determined that my long term career would be outside the M25, not least because I was by now married and looking to the future. I therefore rotated through posts at St George's and St Helier Hospitals. Despite this (!), I was appointed Consultant Nephrologist at St Helier in 2000 with primary responsibility for the catchment area of Frimley Park Hospital, where I now spend two days per week.

Over the last 12 years, I have seen much change. I have seen the Renal Unit grow from 3 to 12 Consultants and become the sixth largest in the country; bed numbers grow from 24 to 56; outpatient numbers quadruple; and spare time evaporate! I have developed particular interests in vasculitis and transplantation and three years ago became Lead Consultant for Transplantation. I am currently involved in a number of research studies, am a member of Council of the British Renal Society and the British Transplantation Society, and am Chair of the Standards Committee of the BTS. In my spare time, I examine and set examination questions for the Royal College of Physicians.

When not working, my weekends are spent with my family. My wife, Caroline, has a number of roles including Chair of Governors of a local primary school, organising me and the children, and part time work in HR and training. We have two sons: David, aged fifteen and Michael, aged twelve. I am just getting used to the teenaged years and find the stresses of work almost joyous in comparison! I enjoy all sport, and still open the batting for my village cricket team; but now, sadly, spend more time as a chauffeur and reliving my youth through my children's exploits on the rugby, hockey and cricket pitches. I am hoping for a dog to complete the family at Christmas, if nothing else because my wife tells me I need the exercise!

We are faced with many new challenges, especially in a difficult financial environment where the future of Epsom & St Helier Trust is uncertain, relationships with St George's are evolving, and new satellite dialysis facilities are opening. I am supported by a fantastic and dedicated team, and look forward to working with you to maintain and improve services over the coming months.

News from the Renal Nursing Team

My last article in the summer of 2010 highlighted many changes that had been implemented to continue to improve our infection control practice. I have summarised the changes:

- Development of a 'Cohort' Ward for patients requiring isolation, this is on Beacon Ward
- A new policy for 'locking' haemodialysis catheters after dialysis, the new locking solution contains antibiotics and heparin, to help prevent infection
- MRSA admission swabs are now analysed using a different technique, this will give us results within a few hours, so patients can be nursed in appropriate isolation facilities if appropriate
- Disposable and single patient BP cuffs
- Enhanced cleaning of all equipment on the Renal Unit on a regular basis
- 2 person technique used when commencing and completing Haemodialysis using a permacath.

A further changes that has been implemented since last summer is:

- Relaunch of blood culture policy- to ensure aseptic technique is used when testing blood for infection, we are hoping to minimise the risk of contamination.

We are working towards using specific cannulation packs, so when patients require a cannula, all the specific dressings etc are included in a sterile pack.

The Renal Unit infection control training reached 100%, the best in the Trust. This confirms the commitment of the whole renal team, working together to reduce infection rates.

At the time of writing this, all of the hard work and changes appear to have made a significant impact on the Renal Unit Infection Rates for MRSA Bacteraemia and Clostridium Difficile (CDT).

Infection Control will continue to be a priority for 2011, we will keep you updated with further changes and the impact these have.

Changes to monitoring Observations

Research has shown that performing manual Blood Pressure recordings (using the old fashioned inflated cuffs and stethoscopes), and nurses monitoring the pulse rate by feeling the pulse in your wrist has advantages over the current practice of using the electronic dynamaps. Irregular pulses, clammy skin, patient temperature can also be monitored just by touching your wrist whilst monitoring your pulse rate. So, over the next few months, any patients admitted to our wards at St Helier will notice that nurses and healthcare assistants will be using the old fashioned methods. The use of the electronic dynamaps will be minimal, but still present in patients requiring frequent monitoring.

I can confirm that frilly hats and starched aprons will not be returning to the wards.....

Assisted Automated Peritoneal Dialysis (aAPD)

Health Care Assistants trained and employed by Epsom and St Helier NHS Trust will soon be supporting the small number of patients who are on aAPD. This initiative will support us in increase the number of patients on this form of treatment. This treatment option is suitable for patients who chose to perform home treatment using peritoneal dialysis, but are unable to manage CAPD or APD independently. A healthcare assistant attends the patients home daily to set up the APD machine. The patient then connects themselves to the APD machine overnight, then disconnect in the morning.


Renal Patients and the Seasonal Flu Vaccine

The Department of Health recommends that all patients with chronic kidney disease, and all those on drugs to suppress their immune system, should be vaccinated against seasonal flu. Please contact your GP Surgery to arrange vaccination.

The only exception is patients who have received a recent Transplant (within the last 3 months) - in this instance discuss with your nephrologist first.



South West Thames Institute for Renal Research



I wish to start by wishing all the readers of Renality a very happy new year. As many of you know I usually spend my New Year's Eve (or Hogmanay I should say) in Scotland. And around this time of year we seem to spend as much time looking to the past as looking to the future, "for the sake of auld lang syne" and all that.

So even though we are usually very forward looking people at the Institute, and I'll return to that later, I have had occasion to reflect on the past a little. In November there is the annual international kidney meeting, the ASN, and last year (2010) when I was there I ran into James Browne, well more than ran into him I went to hear him give a talk. Some of you may remember the name James Browne, not the singer but the marathon running young scientist who did his PhD with me here at the Institute. James is currently working in Chicago with a leading US research team studying diabetic nephropathy. It's very encouraging seeing someone we trained doing so well. The first three years of James' studies was paid for by a grant I was awarded from the Research & Development Department here at St Helier but the final year was paid for by the generosity of our donors and people who had left us a legacy. And the way of these things is that when you start thinking about one person from the past you often start to think about others; our first scientist PhD student was Alex Pearson whose work was also supported by a combination of different funding sources including legacies. Alex worked in Renal Research for nearly 10 years before he moved over to cancer research; I noticed his name as one of the authors of a very impressive paper about breast cancer just last year. I mention these chaps because of the extremely impressive work they are now doing and will probably continue to do and I think what a tribute they are to the Institute and what a real living legacy they are to the people who helped support them in their PhD training by making donations or leaving money in their will.

That is the past and as I said the very nature of what we do here at the Institute is the future. We must make sure we continue to train scientists and clinicians as well as performing our own ground breaking research.

A little while ago I mentioned to you that we had a bright new PhD student with us by the name of Irbaz Badshah (or Buzz for short), well at this very moment I am also in the process of trying to recruit another, a young man who would bring all his own funding. Obviously our reputation is growing because this chap actually approached me about coming to the Institute and if we can get the relevant paper work sorted out we may be able to bring him to SWTIRR by March or April 2011. Both of these scientists are going to be delving into a new area of research for us; their work will involve studying human podocytes. And what is a human "podocyte"? Well I'm sure the classical scholars among you can see that it comes from the two Greek words meaning foot and cell; it is, indeed, a type of cell that appears to have feet. In fact it is a cell that plays a very important role in the filtering function of the kidney, is severely affected by diabetes and may play a role in diabetic nephropathy.

It is not often that we have two scientist PhD students in the Institute rather than 2 doctors but there is increasing financial pressure on the renal unit and us and although we consider it part of our mission to train junior doctors in the science underlying kidney disease and produce well rounded expert consultants this is an expensive venture. I have no intention of stopping the current programme we have of training renal registrars in research but we have to use our money the best way we can in our fight against kidney disease.

Looking to the future –

Renal and Diabetic research at the South West Thames Institute for Renal Research.

It was a late summers evening in 1989 a group of patients and carers gathered at a house in Sutton. It wasn't a social gathering, many of us hadn't met before and yet from that gathering Dr Mike Bending's vision of the South West Thames Institute for Renal Research was born.

Shortly after that meeting the “Epsom Kidney Fund” was renamed the “SW Thames Kidney Fund” and I became involved, firstly as the fundraiser and then once the building work of the new laboratories started as the project co-ordinator for the fund.

It was a fascinating process, with tremendous support from patients, staff, carers and friends. I had been involved in fund raising for local charities but only on a relatively small scale. The challenge of raising the £745,000 to build the new laboratories and then much of the funding to equip the Institute was not without its problems and disappointments but by the end of 1995 we had raised most of the fund needed. Thanks to those who helped and made it possible, in 1999 the Institute opened its doors and has continued to expand its work through to today.

The Issues Facing the Institute today.

Firstly the uncertainty of funding:- Research grants and commercial funding which has been a major source of income has been dramatically reduced. **We need new sources of funding if we are to ride out these difficult times.**

Secondly we need to expand the Institute's facilities:- If the Institute is to continue it's work and naturally grow we will need to expand the building and provide new equipment. **We need the funding to enable this to happen.**

We have never employed any paid fundraisers, the patients, staff, carers and friends have always been our unpaid fundraisers, **Over 99% of money raised has been spent on the Institute and its research programs.**

The Task Ahead - Raise £2,000,000 in the next 2 to 3 years.

Operational Fund. - Raise an additional £1,000,000 to ride out the shortfall in our running costs and expand the research over the next 3 or 4 years.

Building Fund. - Raise another £1,000,000 needed to expand the building and provide new equipment.

How do we achieve our target? - With your help!

In 1989 I left that meeting in Sutton thinking that I must have been crazy to get involved in such a project as to build a Research Institute. We had about 2,000 patients and carers at the time and they raised the funds needed to get the building built.

Today we have sent out about 5,000 copies of 'Renality' together with a DVD which explains how the South West Thames Kidney Fund works to fund the work of the Institute. It also explains how Helier Scientific Ltd. exploits commercial opportunities and passes back all profits to the South West Thames Kidney Fund to support the research at the Institute.

Renality is read on average by at least a patient and a carer. This should mean that about 10,000 people will read this article and hopefully watch the DVD. If everyone of those who read the article and watched the DVD raised £200 over the next two years that is £2 per week over the next two years we would reach our target. I can hear you all saying to yourselves but it just does not work like that, and you are right, it does not, but we would have raised £2,000,000!

What will work is if everyone tries to raise £200, some will perhaps only raise £20 or £50 over the two years some £100 some £200. Some will surprise themselves and raise may be £500 or £1,000. Some will surprise themselves and raise much more. You may wish to remember the South West Thames Kidney fund in your will.

How do you raise your £200. The best advice I can offer is to ask you to talk to your friends and family, show them the DVD if you can, we do have some spare copies if needed and the film clips will be on our websites. You will be surprised how willing friends and family are to help when asked. When we were fund raising to build the institute in 1990 one pensioner with a number of medical issues spoke to a number of his friends one of which was organising a charity golf day, some weeks later he was handed a cheque for just under £8,000 for the fund. We received several very large donations that were made simply because someone told somebody who told somebody else. It does work; try it. Do contact us if you need any help or wish to join a local fund raising group.

If you are on Facebook or another social networking group why not use it as part of your fund raising effort.

Renal replacement therapy can cost up to £50,000 per year for some patients. Here is your chance to help fund valuable research to improve the treatment of renal disease and diabetes both now and in the future.

Dear Kidney Funders,

For over forty years Renal Consultants at St Helier Hospital have been pressing for improved access to renal services in Surrey. In ancient history we opened clinics at St Luke's Hospital in Guildford, and this was subsequently transferred to The Royal Surrey County Hospital. Clinics followed at Frimley Park and St Peter's Hospital and Kingston Hospital, but still there was an enormous void in Renal Services between St Helier Hospital, Carshalton and St Mary's Hospital Portsmouth.

This deficiency was partly remedied by the opening of satellite dialysis units in Woking, Crawley, and Farnham.

Through 2010 it looked as though in-patient facilities for patients with renal failure might be provided in Surrey, but the financial crisis may prevent this.

Meanwhile research and development continues apace in the Institute for Renal Research at St Helier, and your Kidney Fund continues to raise money to ensure this continuation. Branches of the fund are extremely vigorous in Farnham and Sutton but we desperately need new supporters and new ideas in Croydon, Redhill and Reigate, Wandsworth, Kingston, Esher, Chertsey and Guildford. Working together on a cause that is so important to all in the Kidney community can be most invigorating, enjoyable and great fun.

2010 saw the second five year assessment of the quality of renal research pursued. This was conducted by five visiting Professors from around the country. The feed back was very encouraging and quite a few suggestions were made for modifications and improvement in our work.

Elsewhere in this journal you will be able to read Dr Mark Dockrell's report on the research we are engaged in.

During the last year Richard Sammons has again challenged us to consider extending the Institute, providing more laboratory space and better conference facilities. If we are to keep up with Richards dream (page 13) we are going to have to work even harder at providing the necessary funds.



I had just returned from Austria where I had been training often in the lakes. I was so shocked when I found out I just sat down and didn't train for 5 months. The consultant advised me to have a biopsy to determine the exact disease I have. Foolishly I have not had the biopsy yet as I'm kinda nervous to have this procedure. I work as a personal trainer and I coach running too sometimes.

RICHARD EVERSDEN - Last year a friend, aged 26, died very tragically after a successful heart transplant. His family had the courage to donate his kidneys before his life support was turned off as they believed it would have been his wish as his life

had been transformed by the transplant and he would want the same for others. In addition my mother has worked for the Trust for many years and leads the lithotripsy team. I know something of her work and the importance of clearing kidney stones.

I chose the S W Thames Kidney Fund because of the above reasons and also I believe the high profile charities get a lot of support but there are smaller charities such as this, which do equally important work but do not get the same level of income. I am pleased that I can make a contribution to their research funds.
